



Nathalie Du Pasquier joins forces with Mutina to "mind the gap" at Vittoria subway station in Brescia

One more time, Mutina, the innovative Italian company of ceramic covering materials, collaborates with renowned artist and designer Nathalie Du Pasquier for a very special project: Mind the Gap, a permanent installation, exclusively fashioned by the French creator for the Vittoria subway station in Brescia, featuring Mattonelle Margherita tiles. Mind the Gap redefines the fruition of the space through original compositions of shapes and colours, obtained by using the ceramic elements of the collection. The installation, inaugurated on February 17th 2022, invites all the passengers who encounter it in their everyday life to change perspective and be open to new levels of experience, transforming the entrance of the subway into an "other" space that fluctuates between figuration and abstraction.

"Looking back at my work, I see that fashion has always been there", Annie Leibovitz observes in the preface to *Wonderland*, a new edition by Phaidon. "Fashion plays a part in the scheme of everything, but photography always comes first for me. The photograph is the most important part. And photography is so big that it can encompass journalism, portraiture, reportage, family photographs, fashion ... My work for Vogue fueled the fire for a kind of photography that I might not otherwise have explored". The book includes 350 extraordinary images - many of them previously unpublished - featuring a wide and diverse range of subjects and a foreword by Anna Wintour.

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
Eternal kiss

Fifty years later and still sexy. Or how Mae West's lips became an iconic sofa by Salvador Dalí


It was in 1935 that Salvador Dalí, inspired by the face of voluptuous actress Mae West, illustrated in watercolour a surrealist apartment. Her lips were turned into a sofa so seductive that British arts patron Edward James requested a three-dimensional version. In the years to come, several sofas of the genre saw the light until 1972 when Salvador Dalí, along with Oscar Tusquets designed the Dalilips sofa for the Mae West Hall at the Theatre Museum in Figueres. More than thirty years had to pass before it became possible to put this sensual design into industrial production by BD Barcelona. Thanks to polyethylene rotational moulding technology, it has become possible to reproduce the realism and expressive force which Dalí dreamt of for this large-scale mouth which you can sit on or sink into.









When walking through the garden of Alex Varveris and Melissa Metaxa's home, you feel uplifted like being in the countryside. "The first thing that captured our attention was the garden", the owners recall. "Not for its indisputable beauty but for the way it surrounds the house equidistantly, which is unusually, and with ingenuity, placed in the centre of the property. Nowadays architects tend to place houses in the "front row", closer to the street spoiling all the beauty. We also fell in love with the wonderful cobblestone path that leads from the entrance to our doorway - so simple yet so special". The house evolves on a single level with the living spaces opening to the front garden ensuring, at the same time, privacy for the bedrooms and the kitchen, facing a backyard with an elevated dining table, the pool area and a seductive lotus tree.

An aesthetic mix of design pieces, vintage items and antiques together with travel mementos and findings characterize the interior decoration, while paintings by notable Greek artists like Fassianos and Sikeliotis stand next to art by Marnie Weber and photographs by

Nothing is left to chance - every piece has been handpicked, carrying a memory and a story to tell - yet everything flows as an expression of effortless style and easy living. Alex, the CEO of Moda Bagno group, and Melissa, the creative force behind the Free Shop and Wildwood fashion brand are binded with refined taste and innovative design. A natural palette scheme of off whites, beiges and greys, with flashes of green and nude pinks, are paired with raw wood, cast metal, soft leather, cotton and cashmere.

"We are seduced by newness in design and we are

drawn by the authentic, the texture of the handmade surface as it captures the light. We love natural materials; the luxury, understatedness and simplicity that their preciousness unveils. I love lamps - auction pieces but also simple ones, trends of the season", Alex explains. "But, after all, it's about the feeling in everything - in every corner, in every item it's about being meaningful to us and our family". Home life flows with the course of the day. Mornings are beautiful for prolonged breakfasts, which in the warm months are served in the backyard. The kitchen plays a leading role in the house, filled with natural light, offering direct access both to the dining room and the open-air table in view of the pool and the garden. In the afternoons, the living room,

featuring a big Minotti sofa strategically facing the front garden as in a frame of rejuvenating green - paired with two vintage Baxter leather armchairs and a CC-Tapis rug - is the place for relaxation and casual gatherings. A second living room draws my attention, striking in style with a classic De Padova sofa dressed in exotic textile. A huge library full of art and design books, classic literature and novels extends openly to a second level, where a secret room, still unfinished, awaits to take its role.

"Our house is our home, it evolves and grows with us. It has to be comfortable and functional, a shelter and a place to share with family and friends".



Practical spirit

Daphne Leon, the ceramist who became internationally known for her collaboration with the designer Jacquemus, talks about her art, drawing inspiration from the material she handles and the processes of her work: solid and simple.

Daphne Leon's plates in off-white, with the embossed yatagans can be seen in the front displays of the Benaki shop in Pireos street. The Museum's shop complemented the anniversary exhibition "1821 Before and After", which concluded last November, with a call to designers and artists who responded by transcribing into objects - decorative and utilitarian - memories of the uprising against the Ottoman oppressor. Blue, red and gold dominated the designs. Her own works, however, look faint like old traces, just as memory works after 200 years. "In the beginning, I started working on this idea myself as well, using colour. But I quickly realized that I, too, preferred them as they looked before firing. Aesthetics show the way for any of my choices". She explains that in general, she will opt for something minimal as long as it's a minimalism that makes sense, otherwise she won't hesitate to go against the grain and sign off on something super kitsch. "There has to be a reason for doing something one way or another. I don't put that much thought into the form," she points out.

In her preparatory year for university in England and while she had already decided that she would study graphic design, she walked past a room where they were teaching bookbinding. The sight won her over. Ceramics came several years later. "Already from my University years, I was obsessed with clarifying that I am not an artist. I liked folding paper. Even today, working with my hands is for me the most exciting and important part of my work".

It was her collaboration with Jacquemus for the "Oursin" restaurant in Paris that quickly brought her international publicity, but above all it was an opportunity to discover another - more arty - side of ceramics. "For me, the challenging part of this project was that I had to design the restaurant's serving dishes. People didn't know this and the journalists didn't focus on this. They focused on the 'sculptural' plates that complemented the actual dishes on the table". The inspiration for this series was some of Picasso's dishes with embossed fish. "If I tried to do the same, it would have just been a bad copy. I never thought of them as decorative plates on a wall. Their place was on a table; they never shed their 'utilitarian' role. I can imagine them on a coffee table, along with books. They would not be the centrepiece. They are best brought out through interaction with other objects".

The chapel plate she made for the shop of the

Museum of Cycladic Art was similarly inspired as an indirect reference to the dove plate of the early Cycladic period or the coffee cups with their blush tones. "I take elements from tradition: techniques or decorative methods, colours. But as an overall approach, I will never touch that part. It's another world, the traditional; it doesn't belong in my hands. Greek traditional pottery is a living tradition, it triumphs. You have to find another way to exist".

She often stresses how what excites her is executing someone else's ideas and she enthusiastically mentions to me the collaboration she started with an e-shop of a French company. She committed to doing a large production for them on their own design. "That's something I really like. They showed me a 3D design and I was invited to execute the design by putting my own eye and technique into it. I'm more intrigued by getting close to and delivering what you're thinking about - as long as I'm interested in it, of course, either on a technical level or as a concept - rather than spending time on my own ideas. I am motivated by another's suggestion and their expectation. I'm not a studio potter, that's the difference. I find it more creative to make a mould in the press even if that work doesn't show. The other requires a lot of discipline".

I am thinking, as she speaks, that it is difficult to meet such a "solid" personality, earthy, who concentrates on the technical part, defying the artistic dimension of her works, so interesting that she "mixes" the utilitarian with the decorative and celebrates the "drudgery" of her work. "Have you seen my Instagram account?" she asks me, interrupting my thoughts. "At first I had terrible qualms about these posts. People see these highly stylized images of super clean porcelain and are unaware that these objects came out of a messy, muddy, dusty environment. It seems like you're doing the process an injustice, doesn't it. That's why now in the stories I show the whole journey of an object".

I ask her what her home is like. She replies that it is a mix of old and modern, with furniture she has from her student days, lots of books, ceramic vessels from other potters - each different - and flowers. "I don't have any pots, but I buy a lot of flowers at the farmers market and that will be my next sculptural project. I'm going to make ceramic vases with calla lilies. My grandmother gave me the idea. Besides, the first ceramic dishes I saw in my life that I admired were at her house".







The visionnaire

Diving into the world of gallerist and art curator Andreas Melas

My first interview with Andreas Melas was back in 2009. Introducing the AMP Gallery to the Athenian scene was a hit, marked by the presence of Jeff Koons, Maurizio Cattelan and Jeffrey Deitch. In his early thirties then, and having studied in London and New York - specialising in Communication Art and Design - with valuable work experience next to Jeffrey Deitch and with a base off the beaten track- he was full of passion, eager to introduce international artists and contemporary art to the Athenian audience. A decade later, and with an admirable number of synergies and curated exhibitions under his belt, I find him in his gallery, Melas-Martinos, in 50 Pandrosou Street. The space is familiar. It's the landmark four-storey building with the characteristic façade, redesigned in the early '60s by architect Takis Zenetos, where the Martinos

Antique and Fine Art Gallery is located, carrying a history of 127 years, renowned for combining quality and rarity with exquisite taste. "After a hiatus of a few years, I returned to Athens to look for a space to host our next exhibition, Melas recalls. "It was during a random meeting with my mother (Eleni Martinos) at Pandrosou that we suddenly saw the space from a totally new perspective. All the details, its unique architecture, its scale, were suddenly laying bare for us to see. We worked on it gradually, and eventually did a proper renovation led by my wife and architect, Sofia Xanthakou, with an aim of preserving the unique architectural features, essentially stripping the building down to its original structure". Counting already 6 exhibitions since 2018 (first with drawings by Karl Wirsum organised by Dan Nadel), Melas speaks

of a synergy with Martinos, blurring the boundaries between art, design, architecture and more.

Although usually associated with Contemporary Art and with expertise that spans from the '60s to today, Melas avoids being placed in a singular context. He tends to bring together art and artists of different art movements, periods and styles, being interested in the dynamic relationship developed, which then leads to a creative dialogue. For example, the Anti Structure Exhibition, organized at the Deste Foundation for Contemporary Art last summer, took as its starting point an immersive installation with works by Urs Fischer placed in dialogue with the works of 21 Greek and Cypriot artists of various generations and modalities, exploring the realm of fine lines between order and chaos, stasis and flux, structure and fragility. Tracing the meaning, evident from the title, is that in times of great happenstance, culture in fact reboots itself and new symbols, models and paradigms arise.

"It's always about the dialogue", Melas explains. "I don't believe in setting boundaries between disciplines. It is also about refinement", he states. It seems evident, considering Melas' family background and upbringing, surrounded by antiques and fine art from a young age. (The Martinos collection is known for Islamic art, fine furniture, rare ceramics, paintings and sculptures combined with an exquisite twentieth-century collection of decorative objects, furniture and lighting, from the Art Deco era to the Memphis group of the '80s.) "As a child, you are not particularly interested in objects, however you learn to live with them, and inevitably you build a relationship. As you grow up, you see things differently, with new eyes, from a new perspective – this is the beauty of it".

The crossover of design and art was present in "Lives of an Object", an exhibition which started as a discussion around ceramics and the various iterations of the ancient Kernos vessel. "We redirected our focus beyond the Kernos vessel, exploring the shifts that occur through the inevitable appropriations of an object. Within its lifespan, it will be utilized, broken,

fixed, traded, sold, swapped, discarded and reused – transitioning in function and meaning from one state to the next as though recasting itself anew. An object can be afforded numerous lives within its individual trajectory".

Frequencies, on the other hand, organized by Helena Papadopoulos and Andreas Melas as a series of exhibitions around and about the work of Bia Davou and Pantelis Xagoraris, consider connections, flows, continuities, fuzzy boundaries, topologies, atmospheres, oscillations, pulsions, waves, vibrations, sequences and repetitions. Presented at Radio Athènes on Petraki Street and at the Melas Martinos gallery until May 2022, the exhibitions in both spaces are designed to be experienced as breaks from the dissonant sonic and visual landscape of downtown Athens and as repositories of material histories, languages and subjectivities from the 1960s to today.

Despite the new gallery space established in Athens, Melas keeps his base in London, sharing his time between the two cities. "London is a massive metropolis with enormous cultural capital, such as museums, galleries, theatres et cetera, and an equally powerful support system to back it, both financially as well as symbolically. Athens, a much smaller city, often allows for more experimentation nowadays, as it operates in the fringes of the art market. Though interest has increased exponentially compared to a decade ago due to an influx of artists, a new breed of collectors as well as a flourishing international interest in our city, the art market remains relatively small, but the signs of real and deep change are truly promising. It is an exciting time to be here".

New projects?

Our next exhibition will feature work by the great Yorgos Tourkovasilis, an incredible photographer who was active between the 1970s and early 1980s, first in Paris and then in Athens, Sadly, he passed away recently, so this will be a tribute of sorts. The exhibition will be split among Radio Athènes, Akwa Ibom and our space at Pandrosou.

The criteria differ as collecting is a deeply personal thing. At its most basic level, one has to love what they're buying, this is of utmost importance. Some of the most important art collections have been built with investment being an afterthought.

Which work of art you would like to own? I would love to own and live in Eileen Gray's villa E-1027 in Roquebrune-Cap-Martin.

A real influencer in your field.

Trailblazer Epi Protonotariou, the cofounder and director of DESMOS Gallery which in the 1970s-1980s broke ground with often subversive exhibitions in an otherwise conservative Athenian landscape.

Favourite gallery.

Thomas Ammann and his sister Doris who took over the reins after Thomas died prematurely in 1996 were impeccable gallerists and private dealers.

The work of art or an artist that changed your mindset.

Philip Guston, who dramatically reinvented himself at the pinnacle of his career and risked his art-world standing when he first exhibited paintings vastly different in style from the ones that placed him among the luminaries of NY School of Abstract Expressionism in the '50s. He stayed true to his vision, developing a complex and highly personal iconography. During his years of "isolation", exiled from the art world, his artistic output was remarkable.

Are you always influenced by the story behind a work of art or an artist?

An artwork is the culmination of a myriad things and circumstances, an aspect that I find fascinating... It is a living paradox as it is inseparable from the context in which it was created, yet its meaning can change vastly depending on how or when one looks at it.




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

The God Shadow of

Award-winning lighting designer **Eleftheria Deko** speaks of the power of light and its expressions and influence in a heart-to-heart, revealing conversation.

Lighting Designer of the Year 2021 for the Lighting of the Acropolis, and world renowned for her role in the Athens Olympic Games in 2004 as Director and Lighting Designer of the Opening and Closing ceremonies, awarded with an EMMY for Outstanding Lighting Direction, Eleftheria Deko has the power of revealing light as the "shadow of God". A leading figure in the field of lighting, she runs an award-winning studio specializing in architectural lighting design, stage lighting and event lighting, with an impressive portfolio including significant lighting projects, implemented in public and private spaces and over 450 performances for theatre, music, dance and opera.

Your milestones - Shaping who you are today

1987 - Being accepted at New York University for a Master's Degree and moving to New York City. Discovering the magic of the art of lighting design in an environment that was free and inspiring, full of creative expression and interdisciplinary connections.

1992 - Returning home. Being a freelance lighting designer, establishing stage lighting design as a profession and starting work in the major theatrical scenes of Greece.

1995 - A near-death experience. Changed my mindset, gave me a different appreciation of life and its values.

1997 - Founding my stage lighting design company.

2000 - Starting an architectural lighting design studio.

2002 - Becoming a mother. In December I gave birth to my precious daughter.

2004 - Being the lighting designer and director of the opening and closing ceremonies of the 2004 Olympic Games in Athens.


2005 - Receiving the Emmy award for Outstanding Lighting Direction for the opening ceremony of the 2004 Olympic Games.

2005 - Becoming a professor of Stage Lighting at the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki (Theatre Department of the School of Fine Arts). Introducing lighting design at an academic level for the first time in Greece.



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2018 - Receiving the first prize in architectural lighting at the international Darc awards (aka the Oscars of the lighting design industry).

2020 - Lighting of the Acropolis.

2021 - Best lighting design of the year international award for the Acropolis lighting.

What light means to you

Light is the essential "food" for our eyes and soul. It is the source of life on earth.

Light is the first sun ray that succeeds the night, the golden summer sun on the desert sand, the moonlight shining on the sea, the colours of the rainbow after the rain.

Light is the sparkle in the eyes of your beloved ones, the aura of a wise person, the reflections of the white marble of the Parthenon. Light is the fiery breath of a volcano, the iridescence of a quartz gem, the Aurora Borealis of the North Pole.

Light has a dual personality and this fascinates me. It is wave and particle; it is both an electromagnetic wave and a photon. It is white and, at the same time, all the colours of the spectrum. It is visible and invisible.

Light can be measured but it is also unmeasurable, it is an idea, a sensation, a thought, a feeling! Light is a way of seeing not only the obvious but also the precious and hidden. Connecting us through nonverbal communication; a transparent connection

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and understanding of our common and universal values. Light is, quoting Plato, "the shadow of God".

The relationship between light, architecture and interiors

Light is a way of expression and an essential tool in architecture. Artificial light works functionally and also aesthetically, acting similarly as it does in the theatre: creating atmosphere, defining space, adding texture and colour to different surfaces, properties which were exclusive to theatrical lighting in previous decades. Due to the technological advances of our times, via the new generation of luminaires, we now have the ability to define light, tame the intensity of light and shape its beam, deflect it in a single direction, to move and alternate its colour hues, to follow the circadian rhythm or unleash beams of light through slits and impressive openings. The abilities and possibilities of architectural lighting are endless and evolving. Through lighting, one may underline the architecture of a building, enhance an atmosphere of interior spaces according to their use, fulfilling the desires of their inhabitants, highlighting the style of interior design or responding to the identity of a building – whether it is a museum, a residence, a store, a restaurant, a mall or a hotel.

As lighting designers, we have a great responsibility, especially when we are called to create the façade lighting of a building, its public "night costume"; this transparent garment that appears after sunset, wishing to beckon the meanderers of the night, to attract their attention; to underline the night personality of a building, by creating an elegant and appropriate night dress in respect to the dark sky, valuing the principles of measure and moderation.

Natural vs artificial light: Association and expression in your work

It is not a dilemma - we need both. We could not live without natural light nor evolve without the artificial one. In my teaching years, I urged my students to observe the natural light during all hours of the day. To observe its behaviour, its colour hues and mostly the shading and shadows. I urged them to be inspired by natural light, something that I am still inspired by. Natural light is an endless source of inspiration - the variety, the power of colours and

of shades. I could spend endless hours analysing natural light, its abilities and its influence, the magic power of day and night, the reflections of the sun and the moon in nature, as well as the human-made marvels in architecture and interior design.

Sources of inspiration

Nature, as mentioned, is an endless source of inspiration. I also intensively study painting in different periods, movements and styles, contemporary art and design.

The project that you keep close to your heart The lighting of the Acropolis.

The projects you are currently working on

Me and my team are working on the new Archaeological Museum of Cyprus, the Hilton home project, the Hangar at the Hellinikon and the Marina Galleria, the renovation of the Intercontinental Hotel in Doha, the Asteria Hotel complex in Voula, the Amathus Hotel in Limassol, the Manna Hotel in Arcadia and the Appotronics office building in Shenzhen, China, as well as a few private residences.

An experience that changed the course of your thoughts

In 1995, I was in coma for a few days after a trip to Indonesia where I got malaria, an infection from a dangerous mosquito bite that was misdiagnosed. There were minor chances of recovering and coming back to life... Obviously, I did (she smiles).

But although I had been troubled with body weakness and side effects for several months, this experience was for me a revelation and, after all, a blessing, redirecting the course of my thoughts, my values and priorities. It changed my view on life and death, developing a strong sense that there is not only what we see and what we prove. There is a whole other world out there, great and wise, pure and bright. I keep this treasured truth.

The lighting of your home

During this period, I am in between cities and stay only temporarily at home, therefore it's an unfinished project (smiles). However, I like warm and simple lighting and, if I could, although against my profession

(smiles again), I would choose to live only with natural sources of light.

Favourite time of day

Sunset and immediately after sunset, when the colours of the sky from orange-red-purple turn to grey-silver and the line of the horizon becomes so thin... almost indistinguishable.

Things you enjoy in life

I love dancing, singing and travelling. At every opportunity - a celebration, a party or even home alone - I love to sing and dance; the dancing music of the '80s or Latin - salsa, merengue, socca... are my favourites. Music also moves me deeply. I love listening to classical, jazz, blues and classic rock. I like cinema and I love the weekend movie-marathons.

I feel happy when travelling in our beautiful world.

I feel more "alive" when visiting new places, getting to know the cultures and people and observing each country's unique light!

I smile a lot, with my face and with my heart. I greet people with a smile and I appreciate it when I get smiles back. Intelligence in all its aspects makes me smile. 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



Every bite can make a difference

Vegan chef and co-founder of Troo Food Liberation **Danae Tsekoura** brings together healthy plant-based cooking and culinary pleasure, a taste of which you will enjoy this summer at The Wild Hotel

The first time I met Danae Tsekoura, eleven years ago, we didn't have the chance to talk much. She was busy preparing avocado salads with a creamy miso dressing and vegan pissaladières with macadamia cheese in the Breeder Feeder's tiny kitchen. The dishes she presented in the Breeder Gallery's pop-up restaurant, made with fruits, vegetables, nuts, legumes and herbs, bordering on comfort-food territory, infused with several less familiar but quite intriguing raw ideas, made their point. It was a vivid, flavourful introduction to Troo Food Liberation, a vegan collective spreading the message of sustainable, cruelty-free food which retains its nutritional value. "Fighting food crime", as they put it, "since 2009".

Later on I learned more. Danae had decided to switch to a plant-based diet at the age of 14, after watching a documentary on factory farming and animal abuse. It was an ethical decision. But, as she says, it was when she started researching ways of selfmanaging one's health, that she began to gain a better understanding of the medicinal qualities and the health benefits of such a diet. Hippocrates' quote "Let food be thy medicine and let medicine be thy food" became her mantra. As many people believe that vegan food can be quite bland tasting, she decided to change their minds. "I love food. The hedonistic part of it. I didn't want the pleasure, the feeling, to be missing. I wanted to cook tasty, nutritious meals, made with love," she says, explaining the reasons that led her to train at the Matthew Kenney Food Future Institute in the U.S. in order to improve her skills.


With the rest of the Troo Food Liberation team, she has cooked in various Athenian venues, organized Eat Ins, setting big tables on the streets, offering vegan specialties and sensitizing consumers on various matters such as the benefits of eating local organic food, the importance of heirloom seeds, the impact of the food industry on the planet. "We weren't trying to be didactic", she remarks, "we were just trying to show there are different, healthier, more environmentally-friendly options". In that direction, they aligned with the Slow Food Movement, organized non-cooking seminars and also introduced their own products, a

series of raw delicacies that aren't processed in any way. First came the Troo Food kale chips, to be followed by crackers, granola, cookies and fruit rolls.

In the last few years, Danae has been teaching professional cooks methods and techniques of raw cuisine, such as sprouting, cooking at a low temperature and dehydration, helping them address the new demands of the tourist industry. She also works as a private chef/ caterer offering choices for people with specific dietary needs, who - for different reasons - choose to eschew animal-based products, and puts together menus for restaurants, juice bars and cafés. The interest in plantbased eating is reaching new levels. Numbers are rising. The vegan community is expanding. But even those that keep a safe distance from veganism find her spiralized winter vegetables and roots - such as pumpkin, celery root and sweet potato, that look like noodles and are covered with a creamy cashew sauce - deliciously rich, and her mushroom soup with chestnuts, leeks and potato, comforting and nourishing.

You don't have to be a herbivore to start your day with a tasty (raw, non-processed) chocolate beverage with cinnamon, macca, a Peruvian root of high nutritional value that tastes earthy, and mesquite, a superfood with a biscuit caramel flavour; it's extremely rich in vitamins and minerals. Or with one of the smoothies or the acai bowl with berries, pineapple, banana, grapefruit juice, and coconut water to be found on the menu Danae designed for Juicy Bee at APIVITA Experience Store. Those smoothies and bowls are guaranteed to get those vegan juices going.

The last thing we talked about is kombucha. The recent spotlight on fermentation has had the food world excited about the possibilities it brings to the table. Kombucha bars started to appear in many cities around the world. The Troo Food Liberation team decided to give it a try at their lab in Ilion. "It was a challenge", Danae says, "but we brew a very special, pure, probiotic, cultured drink that is good for you in many ways. Fizzy, sweet, sour, a bit bitter, it's an acquired taste. It grows on you. But it gives you a buzz. You can feel the energy".


